STATEMENT OF BASIS AND PURPOSE

1. Summary of the basis and purpose for the rule or rule change. (State what the rule says or does and explain why the rule or rule change is necessary).

For the duration of the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) public health emergency, the Department is suspending the requirement to recertify the Certificate of Medical Necessity (CMN) for clients receiving long-term oxygen therapy every twelve months. A CMN recertification will be required for such clients as soon as practicable after the COVID-19 public health emergency has ended. The purpose of the rule is to reduce the risk of exposure to COVID-19 for clients who would otherwise be required to see a physician, or other licensed professional responsible for their care, to obtain the annual CMN recertification.

2. An emergency rule-making is imperatively necessary

Explain:

Suspending the annual Certificate of Medical Necessity (CMNS) recertification requirement for clients on long term oxygen therapy, and thereby reducing the risk of exposure to COVID-19 for clients who would otherwise be required to see a physician, or other licensed professional responsible for their care, to obtain the required CMN recertification, is imperatively necessary for the preservation of public health, safety, and welfare.

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REGULATORY ANALYSIS

1. Describe the classes of persons who will be affected by the proposed rule, including classes that will bear the costs of the proposed rule and classes that will benefit from the proposed rule.

Clients receiving long term oxygen therapy are affected by the proposed rule and will benefit from this rule. There are no anticipated costs to this rule.

2. To the extent practicable, describe the probable quantitative and qualitative impact of the proposed rule, economic or otherwise, upon affected classes of persons.

The qualitative impact of the proposed rule is clients normally required to recertify their Certificate of Medical Necessity for long term oxygen therapy will not be required to recertify for the duration of the COVID-19 public health emergency. Such clients must recertify the CMN as soon as practicable after the COVID-19 public health emergency ends, as declared by the governor of Colorado.

3. Discuss the probable costs to the Department and to any other agency of the implementation and enforcement of the proposed rule and any anticipated effect on state revenues.

There are no anticipated costs to the Department or to any other agency to implement or enforce the proposed rule. There is no anticipated effect on state revenues.

4. Compare the probable costs and benefits of the proposed rule to the probable costs and benefits of inaction.

There are no probable costs of the proposed rule. The benefit of the proposed rule is reducing the risk of exposure to COVID-19 for clients who would normally be required to visit a physician, or other licensed professional responsible for their care, in order to obtain their annual CMN recertification. There are no benefits of inaction. The cost of inaction is potential increased risk of COVID-19 exposure to clients receiving long term oxygen therapy.

5. Determine whether there are less costly methods or less intrusive methods for achieving the purpose of the proposed rule.

There are no less costly methods or less intrusive methods to achieve the purpose of the proposed rule.

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6. Describe any alternative methods for achieving the purpose for the proposed rule that were seriously considered by the Department and the reasons why they were rejected in favor of the proposed rule.

There are no alternative methods to remove the requirement that clients on long term oxygen therapy obtain their annual CMN recertification.

13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23		b. Recertification of the CMN required under Section 8.580.5.C.1 is required every twelve months or when the client's condition changes, whichever comes first. The Pursuant to Public Law 116-127, the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, § 6008, continued coverage of oxygen is required during the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) public health emergency as it was covered prior the emergency. For the duration of the COVID-19 public health emergency, the CMN recertification required every twelve months under this section, and the requirement for annual review pursuant to 42 C.F.R. 440.70(b)(3)(iii), is suspended. Clients must obtain recertification as soon as practicable after the COVID-19 public health emergency ends, as declared by the President of the United States on March 13, 2020, and every twelve months thereafter.

Clients certified for twenty-four consecutive months no longer require a Certificate of Medical Necessity for oxygen, but still require a documented annual review pursuant to 42 C.F.R. 440.70(b)(3)(iii). Documented annual reviews include a renewed prescription for oxygen or other medical record documentation.

Suppliers must have a completed and current Certificate of Medical Necessity on file to support claims for oxygen therapy and oxygen equipment for non-ventilator dependent clients aged twenty and older requiring long term oxygen therapy lasting ninety days or more. For clients certified for twenty-four consecutive months, the most recent certified Certificate of Medical Necessity must be on file.
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
