Areas BHIS will continue to explore to form formal recommendations to PIAC:

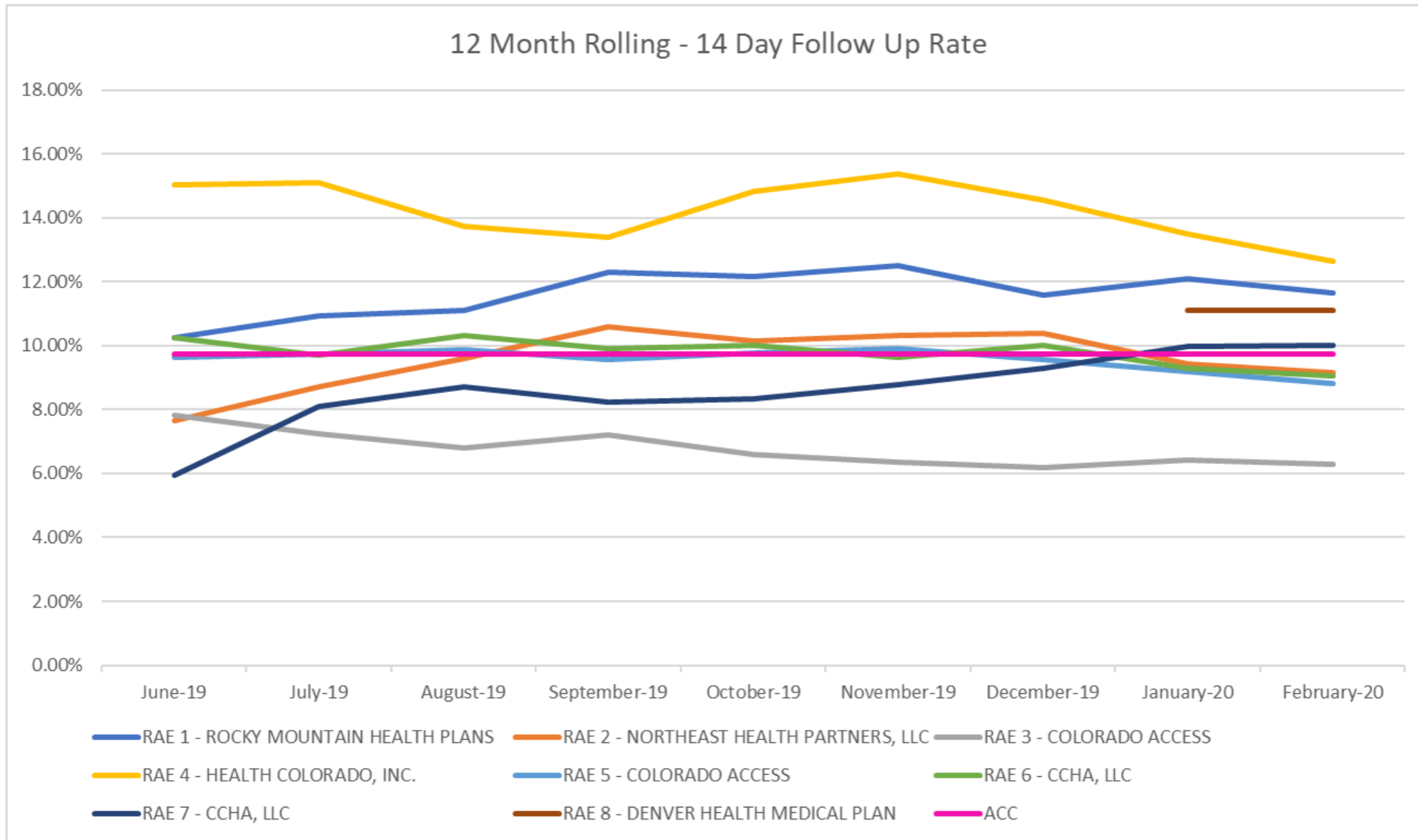
1. Align performance metrics between the two systems

# Department of Corrections Objective

# DOC Work Product

- Submitted a formal recommendation to PIAC in March 2020 to fulfill HCPF's requirement in Senate Bill 222 to develop measurable outcomes to monitor efforts to prevent Medicaid recipients from becoming involved in the criminal or juvenile justice system.
- Proposed metric for behavioral health utilization for members releasing from state prisons:
  - Definition- Percentage of members releasing from state prisons with a behavioral health visit within fourteen (14) days.
  - Services billed under the capitated behavioral health benefit, six short-term behavioral health codes that are billed FFS in primary care, and the DOC/HCPF Roster

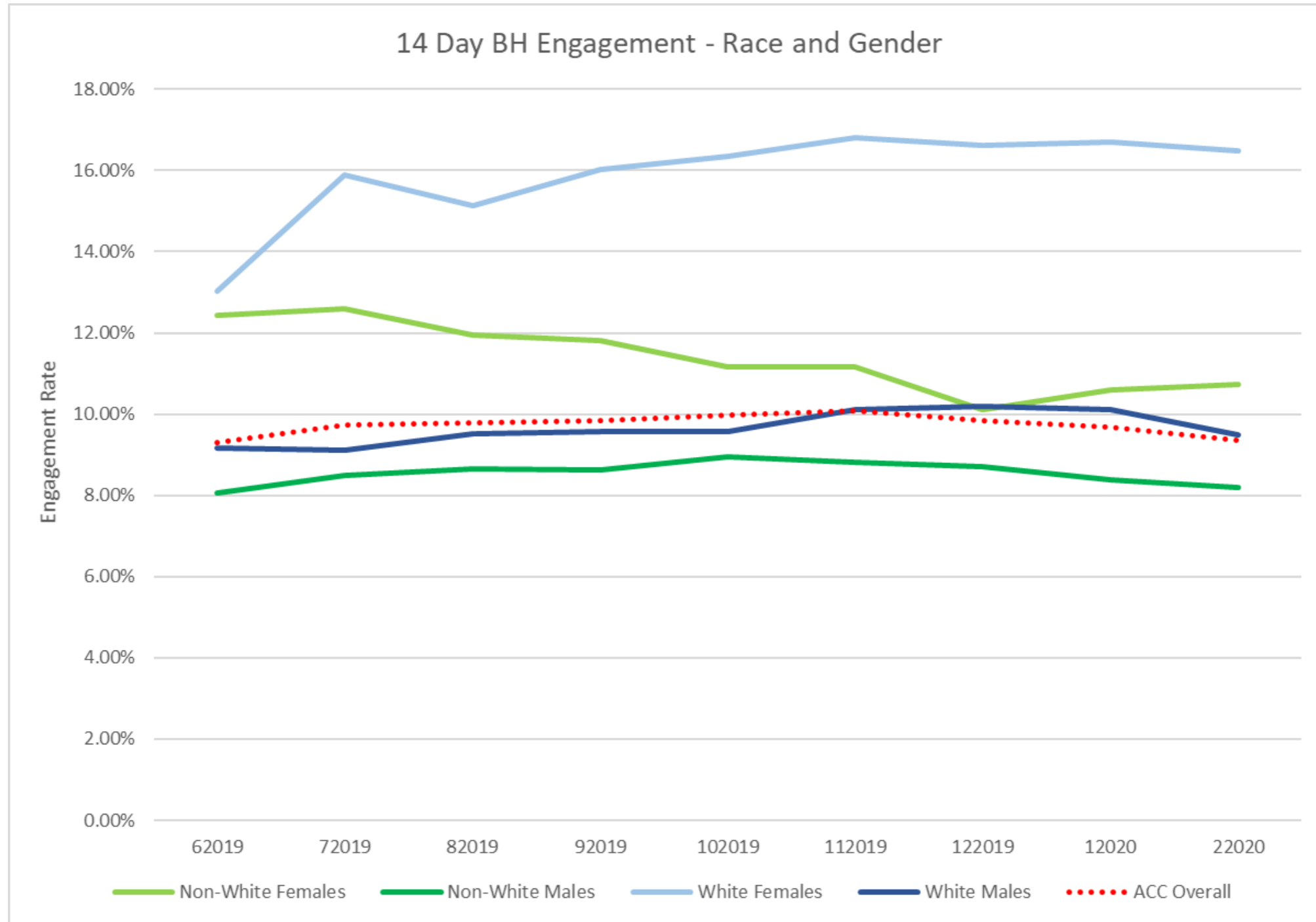
