Meeting called to order at 9:01 AM.

2. Accountable Care Collaborative (ACC) Phase III: Maintaining Local Coordination within Larger Region Accountable Entity (RAE) Regions - Colorado Health Institute (CHI) Kendra Neumann and Allie Morgan

- The group to discuss the RAE requirements for local focus as ACC Phase III is being designed.
- So far, the RAE regions have been aligned with the Behavioral Health Administrative Service Organizations (BHASOs) operating under the Behavioral Health Administration (BHA).
- Stakeholder feedback so far:
 - Timeline concerns
 - More than three regions might be needed
 - Individual county conversations (facilitated by CHI) yielded strong local preferences
- Timeline for Phase III
 - Spring/Summer 2023 concept papers
 - November 2023 draft RAE request for proposal (RFP)
 - April 2024 RAE RFP released
 - September 2024 contracts awarded
 - July 1, 2025 GO LIVE
- Reminder that while the ACC is working to align with BHASO regions at this time, the BHASOs will serve all Coloradoans, not just those on Medicaid.
- The BHIS voting members provide written feedback in an online platform
 - What are RAEs currently doing well to be responsive to communities?
 - Creative funding solutions
 - Prior authorizations
 - Care coordination and peer support
 - Regional PIAC meetings
 - Empowering Providers to act locally
 - Growth of independent provider network (IPN)
 - RAEs as conveners in the community (but are limited by system incentives and some regulations)
 - What can be improves with how RAEs respond to communities within their region?
 - Protect providers from burdensome reporting requirements

- Remove barriers to care in times of crisis (prior authorizations)
- Rate methodologies to better support providers
- More community engagement
- Standardization of administrative services/requirements across RAEs
- Awareness of cultural needs
- Observations around change in narrative about the RAEs. Noticeable positive feedback has emerged in recent months.
- John Laukkanen from HCPF poses the question: which is more valuable, the community responsiveness or the standardization across the state?
 - High utilizer perspective, some RAEs are more willing than others to work with the community and the family. Monique - high utilizer perspective. Some RAEs have high reputation of constantly denying. There are key pieces that don't match across the system.
 - Observation/hypothesis that empowering/paying providers more would balance the regional and standardized components. This might look like consistent regional requirements with providers supported to be the local presence.
- o What are the unique needs in rural communities?
 - Need for more in-person behavioral health professionals, more access to preventative services needed.
 - Denver-based mandates must consider that rural communities have limited resources and are often geographically isolated.
 - Pay providers in rural areas more; incentivize providers to take Medicaid in these areas by increasing rates.
- Further feedback can be sent via the feedback form.

3. Housekeeping

4. Legislative updates with HCPF - Iris Hentze

- Senior Legislative Analyst, Iris Hentze, on the HCPF team joins to provide an overview on the latest legislative session, the HCPF budget, and actionable bills.
 - o 683 bills total were introduced
 - HCPF tracked 79
 - More than 20 HCPF staff testified or provided technical assistance on bills

- HCPF budget agenda highlights
 - All HCPF budget request were approved with only a few small changes by the Joint Budget Committee (JBC)
 - Highlights included rate increases for providers, expansions of services, and administrative resources to support many priority initiatives.
- Behavioral bill highlights:
 - o HB23-1236: Implementation updates to the Behavioral Health Administration (BHA)
 - SB23-002: Medicaid reimbursement for community health services
 - o SB23-174: Access to certain behavioral health services
 - o HB23-1003: School mental health assessment
 - o HB23-1130: drug coverage for serious mental illness
 - o <u>HB23-1200</u>: improved outcomes persons behavioral health
 - o HB23-1269: extended stay and boarding for patients
- Wrap up
 - o From the HCPF perspective, this was a less intense BH session compared to 2022
 - o Many bills were focused on smaller chunks of the system
 - o There were a lot of new legislative members this session

5. Changes to Behavioral Health Administration (BHA) Bill - Andrea Jones

- BHA echoes the experience of doing a lot of foundational educational work during the legislative session.
- o Continued discussions with the BHA team will happen in this meeting.

6. Wrap up and next steps (HCPF)

July meeting cancelled. The meeting was adjourned 10:30 am.
