CHASE Annual Report

Pursuant to section 25.5-4-402.4(7)(e), C.R.S., the CHASE Board is to submit each January 15 a report that includes:

- The recommendations made by the CHASE Board to the Medical Services Board regarding the healthcare affordability and sustainability fee;
- A description of the formula for how the healthcare affordability and sustainability fee is calculated and the process by which the healthcare affordability and sustainability fee is assessed and collected;
- An itemization of the total amount of the healthcare affordability and sustainability fee paid by each hospital and any projected revenue received by each hospital, including quality incentive payments and increased Medicaid and CHP+ eligibility;



CHASE Annual Report cont.

- An itemization of the costs incurred by the CHASE in implementing and administering the healthcare affordability and sustainability fee;
- Estimates of the differences between the cost of care provided and the payment received by hospitals on a per-patient basis, aggregated for all hospitals, for patients covered by Health First Colorado, Medicare, and all other payers; and
- A summary of the efforts made by the CHASE to seek any federal waiver necessary to fund and support the implementation of a health care delivery system reform incentive payments program and program progress.

- Section III, Administrative Expenses, Pages 24-26
- Limited to 3% of total CHASE expenditures; subject to appropriation by the General Assembly
- Includes administrative expenditures for CHASE expansion populations
- \$131 million total funds (state fiscal year basis)
 - Itemized in Table 5
 - \$51.9 million contracted services; majority IT contracts for benefits and claims systems
 - 2.38% total; 0.22% HCPF staff



- Section V, Cost Shift, Pages 27-45
- Using data from Hospital Financial Transparency (HBs 19-1001 and 23-1226)
 - Calculate total costs, uncompensated costs, and payments using hospital-specific cost-to-charge ratio instead of statewide aggregate
- Bad debt and charity care increased 31.5% in 2024, a significant jump that brought these costs above 2013 levels for the first time.
 - Previous years' increases driven by inflation, not the case in 2024.
- Payer mix slight reversion, private insurance grew and government payers shrank.
 - Decrease in Medicaid payer mix, PHE unwind impacts
 - Medicare continued increase

 - 98% of hospitals are on track to hit all their year-four milestones
 - Over 16,000 interim activities across hospital interventions
 - Over 6,300 unique Community Health & Neighborhood Engagement (CHNE) activities
 - Over 4,900 consultations with key stakeholders
 - Over 1,000 community advisory meetings
 - o 360 public engagement meetings

- Rural Support Fund \$12 million per year to 23 hospitals; details in appendix

Hospital Transparency Report Updates

Remember last year's changes

Just like 2025, this report now details:

- Summary of the hospital's financial transfers to/from related parties.
- Narrative report of planned & completed projects and capital investments >\$25 million. Narratives are provided in the appendix.
- Information on physician affiliations and acquisitions.
 - > Information is de-identified and presented in aggregate.
- Summary information on changes to service lines.
- Salary and total compensation data of the top five highest paid administrative positions.
 - Information is de-identified and presented in aggregate.
- Breakouts of uncompensated care costs by new categories (by county designation, by system, by Critical Access Hospital)



2026 Hospital Financial Transparency Report Changes

- Historic and current year analysis sections have been combined so that analysis by item (net patient revenue, total operating expense, etc.) are all together.
 - HCPF heard that it was confusing for where to find certain information based on section (revenue, expenses, profit, etc.)
 - removal of duplicative information or analysis
- Hospitals have completed 15-day review period.

SNF and ICF Provider Fee Transparency Report Updates

SNF and ICF Provider Fee Financial Transparency Report

- Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) and Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) provider fees are now managed within CHASE
- Administration will occur through Nursing Facility Enterprise Support Board
- The CHASE Board may provide oversight and collaborate with the Support Board to carry out responsibilities
- The Support Board, not the CHASE Board, is responsible for making recommendations for MSB regulation approval
- The transparency report will be published to CHASE website shortly
