November 3, 2020

1. Meeting Overview

2. Key Feedback Themes

Person-Centered Budget Algorithm (PCBA) Refresher

- The Department should work to gather more consistent and complete data.
- Utilization data may not be fully capturing resource need and need to consider other ways to capture resource need in PCBA development and analysis.
- Training on administration of the new Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS) Assessment needs to be thorough and consistent.
- The larger service authorization process needs to be person-centered.
- The Department should share specific ways they feel the PCBA is meeting the definition of "person-centered".



- Implementation plan needs to be presented in plain language.
- The Department should work with stakeholders to get more attendees at Statewide Meetings.

New Assessment and Person-Centered Support Plan Overview

- Colorado should consider the implementation of budget neutral consumer direction in all waivers and services. A pilot should be considered.
- Stakeholders are interested in receiving Optumas contract deliverables.
- Effective implementation of the Care & Case Management System will be critical. Need to test the new Assessment and Support Planning process in the new system to ensure its accuracy.
- PCBA processes need to account for the fact that individuals' resource need can change. Cannot rely on an "exceptions process".
- The PCBA process should allow for expeditious review in case of emergencies and/or changed circumstances/needs.

PCBA Development and Update

- Items in the new Support Plan need to be included in the personcentered planning process.
- The PCBA should not be limited solely to Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living (IADLs).
- The PCBA and related processes need to start with a focus on what individuals want for themselves and then also consider other factors. Processes should not be built primarily on ADL, IADL, medical, or behavioral needs.
- Adults and children will likely have different drivers of resource need.
- Individuals doing well because of the supports they currently receive should be considered in PCBA development and their needs appropriately captured to maintain supports.
- There are concerns about using raw utilization as an input to the model. Raw utilization does not always accurately reflect individuals' needs.



- Data need to be excellent to test and validate the PCBA.
- The sequencing of implementing the Assessment, Support Plan, Care & Case Management System and PCBA at the same time seems off. Need to have significantly more new assessments completed within the new system before we implement the PCBA.
