Long Term Services and Supports: Vital services for older adults and people with disabilities

May 2025

Medicaid serves as the <u>single largest payer of</u> <u>Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS) in the</u> <u>United States</u>, significantly impacting the quality of life for older adults and individuals with disabilities. Unlike Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance offer very limited coverage for these essential services, making Medicaid an indispensable safety net.

LTSS assists older adults and people with disabilities with daily activities in institutional settings, such as nursing facilities, or communitybased settings. Services include:

- meal preparation
- personal care (bathing, dressing)
- medication management
- mobility
- community engagement

Nationally, Medicaid funds 61% of LTSS expenditures = \$415 billion in 2022

LTSS makes up 4-5% of Medicaid enrollment and accounts for 42% of total Medicaid claims costs, reflecting the intensive and ongoing nature of these services.

Colorado serves 80,823 individuals* with LTSS

- 45% Older Adults (aged 65+)
- 40% Adults (ages 21-64)
- **15% Children and Adolescents** (Under 20 years, including former foster youth)

LTSS members have significantly higher health care complexity compared to the broader Medicaid population:

- 86% have at least one chronic condition, compared to 28% among general Medicaid enrollees.
- 37% live with 5+ chronic conditions

Significant growth is expected due to demographic shifts and health trends:

- Adults aged 60+ with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) are projected to double by 2030, increasing demand for specialized support.
- ~70% of people aged 65+ will require some form of LTSS, with increased care needs as they age.
- Many LTSS recipients have incomes below the federal poverty level, making Medicaid critical as the primary funding source for these essential services.

Colorado is committed to promoting independence and community integration through HCBS. The state operates <u>10 specialized HCBS waivers</u> tailored to various populations and individualized care needs. These waivers enable members to access care in less restrictive, community-based settings. HCBS waivers not only enhance quality of life but are often more cost-effective than institutional care.
