## Member Eligibility for Children

- CFC benefits are available to all Medicaid beneficiaries who require an institutional level of care:
  - Hospital Level of Care
  - > Nursing Facility Level of Care
  - Intermediate Care Facility for Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities
  - Institution providing Psych services under 21

# Age-Appropriate Guidelines

#### Guidelines

- Provide instructions for using the long-term care assessment for children
- The guidelines help assessors distinguish between a child being unable to perform an Activity of Daily Living (ADL) due to his or her age versus a child requiring assistance to perform an ADL that is above and beyond the assistance typically provided to a peer

#### Ages and Stages

Additional research guidelines for determining child development milestones

#### **CFC** and Assessed Needs

- CFC services must be provided on a statewide basis regardless of the individual's age, type or nature of disability, or severity of disability
- CFC services are provided based on having an assessed need for that service

# Consumer Direction for Children Under CFC

#### **Consumer Direction**

 Under both consumer directed models offered under CFC, In-Home Support Services (IHSS) and Consumer Directed Attendant Support Services (CDASS), children will be able to access Health Maintenance Activities and Basic Homemaker

# Consumer Direction - In Home Support Services

- In-Home Support Services (IHSS) will be expanded under CFC to all children that meet the Level of Care requirements
- IHSS is a service delivery option that allows the member or authorized representative to direct and manage the attendants who provide care with the added support of an agency
- Allows us to waive the Nurse Practice Act
- Through IHSS, the member or AR can select, train, and manage attendants of their choice to best fit their unique needs

# Consumer Direction - In Home Support Services

- Children may be eligible to receive IHSS Health Maintenance Activities (HMA) services
  - > These activities include:
    - Skilled tasks typically performed by a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) or licensed nurse that do not require the clinical assessment and judgment of a licensed nurse
    - HMA tasks can include g-tube feeding and maintenance, trach or vent care, and medical management needs such as blood pressure and blood sugar checks among many other needs
- Children may receive HMA through an IHSS Agency and Personal Care services through the State Plan benefit
- Children may still access medically necessary
   Nursing/Therapy/CNA and Personal Care services as long as there is no duplication with IHSS HMA

#### **Consumer Direction - CDASS**

- The Department is moving forward with the goal of implementing CDASS and IHSS into CFC at the same time
- CFC/CDASS specific discussions are forthcoming
- The CFC/CDASS Workgroup discussion on children and CDASS is currently planned for April 2023

#### **CFC Services for Children**

#### Homemaker

- Homemaker will move from Child Extensive Support Waiver (CES) into CFC
- We will continue to use the same requirements to assess for Homemaker basic for children in CFC as we did for CES - tasks that are above and beyond for parents to do for their child but do not meet Homemaker Enhanced level
- Homemaker Enhanced Extraordinary Cleaning will remain in the CES Waiver
  - The habilitative portion of Homemaker Enhanced will be removed and placed under Homemaker Acquisition, Maintenance, and Enhancement of Skills (AME)

# Acquisition, Maintenance, and Enhancement of Skills (AME)

- Acquisition, Maintenance, and Enhancement of Skills (AME) definition: services and supports related to functional skills training necessary for the member to accomplish ADL/IADLs and health related tasks to increase their independence and reduce supports needed in the home and community
- AME will be an available task under Homemaker
- While children may have access to AME through the Homemaker service, they will likely be able to receive this skills training through therapies provided under Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment (EPSDT)

# Homemaker Example

- A child is receiving Homemaker Basic for excessive laundry as well as Homemaker Enhanced for extraordinary cleaning under the CES waiver
- The child can continue to receive Homemaker Basic for excessive laundry under CFC and will receive Homemaker Enhanced for extraordinary cleaning under the CES waiver
  - The habilitative tasks under Homemaker Enhanced will be removed and placed under AME
  - Children may access AME under Homemaker, if needed

# **Electronic Monitoring**

- Services under Electronic Monitoring
  - Personal Emergency Response System (PERS)
  - Medication Reminders
  - Remote Supports Technology

#### **Electronic Monitoring For Kids**

- Children may have an assessed need for these services
  - For example, an older child in their teenage years who may be left alone for short periods of time (i.e. so the parent can go to the grocery store or a doctor's appointment)
  - Children must be able to use the technology
  - Age-appropriate guidelines need to be considered when issuing this service
- What are times that you could see a child needing electronic monitoring (EM)?


#### **Transition Services**

- Services included:
  - Life Skills Training
  - Peer Mentorship
  - Transition Setup
  - Home Delivered Meals \*
- Children may have an assessed need if they are transitioning
- Covered needs for this service must be for the benefit of the member receiving the service
- Age-appropriate guidelines need to be considered when issuing any of these services

# No Change to Pediatric Personal Care

- Pediatric Personal Care will not move to CFC and remain as-is under the State Plan
  - > CMS guidance
  - Putting Pediatric Personal Care in CFC will make eligibility for the benefit more restrictive due to the level of care requirement
