

Legislative Overview

How a Bill Becomes a Law



Step 2(a): Bill gets introduced into the Senate by the Senate Clerk and referred to at least one committee by the Senate President



Step 2(b): Bill gets introduced into the House by the House Clerk and referred to at least one committee by the Speaker of the House



Step 3(a): Bill gets a public hearing and vote in the committee of reference



Step 3(b): Bill gets a public hearing and vote in the committee of reference



Step 4(a): Bill gets heard, debated, and voted on in the Senate Floor



Step 4(b): Bill gets heard, debated, and voted on in the House Floor









Step 5: Bill goes to the Governor's desk where the Governor may veto the bill or sign the bill into law

Why Legislation for CFC?

- The budget request (BA-07: Community-based Access to Services) for CFC funding was submitted in November 2022, approved by the JBC in March 2023, and approved in the Long Bill in April 2023
 - This request addressed the Department of Justice findings by:
 - Providing transition and community service information to members living in nursing facilities
 - Additional transition coordination units
 - Broader housing navigation, etc.
- Part of this request included changes to statute to ensure that the Department has statutory authority to implement CFC

Why Legislation for CFC?

- Placing CFC in state statute gives the Department authority to implement the program
- Statutory authority from the State shows the Center's for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and the Colorado Medical Services Board (MSB) that the Department has the support of the legislature to implement the program
- Additionally, statute changes for CFC ensures that all other HCBS statutes are aligned and don't contradict CFC once CFC is implemented

Senate Bill 23-289

- Community First Choice Medicaid Benefit (<u>SB 23-289</u>) is sponsored by the members of the Joint Budget Committee (JBC)
 - > Full sponsorship from the JBC is rare
 - Bills carried by the JBC have a higher chance of passing

CFC Portion of the Bill

- Leaving the bill language broad allows for future changes and flexibilities with the CFC program in Code of Regulation and with CMS
- The bill language mimics language found in federal statute for CFC
- Language includes:
 - Definitions for mandatory services
 - Mandatory services
 - Consumer direction options including IHSS and CDASS
 - Federal language for optional services

HCBS Statute Adjustments

- Additional sections of the bill include "repealing" the portions of HCBS waivers that will be moving under CFC
 - ➤ For example, 25.5-6-301-314 is the statute for the Elderly, Blind, and Disabled (EBD) waiver. Section 303 of this statute includes definitions for services that will be moving to CFC including: electronic monitoring, homemaker, and personal care
 - Since these definitions have moved into CFC statute, we need to remove them from EBD statute

HCBS Statute Adjustments

 Other sections of this bill include amending language to reflect CFC eligibility

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HCBS Statute Adjustments

- Finally, this bill repeals the Children with Autism Waiver from statute since this waiver is no longer provided in Colorado
 - The services from this waiver were moved into Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT)
 - By repealing this statute, Colorado State Statute will reflect how home and community-based services are currently provided by HCPF

 - Introduced on 4/18/23
 - Unanimously passed Senate Health and Human Services Committee on 4/20/23
 - Unanimously passed Senate Appropriations 4/26/23
 - Put on the Consent Calendar in the Senate where the bill passed unanimously 4/27/23
 - Passed the House Public and Behavioral Health and Human Services Committee unanimously 5/2/23
