## STATEMENT OF BASIS AND PURPOSE

An emergency rule-making is imperatively necessary

1. Summary of the basis and purpose for the rule or rule change. (State what the rule says or does and explain why the rule or rule change is necessary).

House Bill 22-1068, codified at § 25.5-5-332, C.R.S., allowed for Hippotherapy services (Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, or Speech Therapy services using Equines as a treatment tool) to be available as a State Plan Medicaid Benefit to any eligible members who meet the medically necessary criteria for this service effective July 1, 2024. With the implementation of this expansion of State Plan Medicaid Benefits, Hippotherapy as it is currently offered would be duplicative of the state plan service. The Office of Community Living (OCL), Benefits and Services Management Division (BSMD) within the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing is amending and renaming the Hippotherapy waiver benefit to Therapeutic Adaptive Equine Activities. Therapeutic Adaptive Equine Activities are therapeutic activities that use the horse to assist in the development and enhancement of skills that help support improved motor skills, self-regulation, communication opportunities, and social and emotional well-being. This rule change revises the definition and naming convention of this benefit within the Home and Community-Based (HCBS) waiver benefits section of the rule.

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## **REGULATORY ANALYSIS**

1. Describe the classes of persons who will be affected by the proposed rule, including classes that will bear the costs of the proposed rule and classes that will benefit from the proposed rule.

This definition and name change of the benefit does not impose costs on a specific class of person. The benefit expansion affects members enrolled in the Children's Extensive Supports (CES) waiver, Children's Habilitation Residential Program (CHRP) waiver and the Supported Living Services (SLS) waiver. These members are both children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and all members of these waivers can benefit from the proposed rule.

The Department anticipates the Therapeutic Adaptive Equine Activities benefit will serve approximately 275 members on the Children's Extensive Supports (CES) waiver, Children's Habilitation Residential Program (CHRP) waiver and the Supported Living Services (SLS) waiver in the 2024-2025 fiscal year. Replacing the Hippotherapy waiver benefit with the Therapeutic Adaptive Equine Activities waiver benefit will be cost neutral as the budget is already approved and allocated for the Hippotherapy waiver benefit and the funds will be used for the Therapeutic Adaptive Equine Activities benefit.

2. To the extent practicable, describe the probable quantitative and qualitative impact of the proposed rule, economic or otherwise, upon affected classes of persons.

Stakeholders should experience a positive qualitative impact from this regulation revision. In addition to being able access hippotherapy through State Plan benefits, they will also be able to access Therapeutic Adaptive Equine Activities through waiver benefits to assist in the development and enhancement of skills which help support improved motor skills, self-regulation, communication opportunities and social and emotional wellbeing.

The probable quantitative impact of the proposed rule is the potential to achieve cost savings for the Department when members can receive supportive interventions in community settings and prevent institutional placement.

3. Discuss the probable costs to the Department and to any other agency of the implementation and enforcement of the proposed rule and any anticipated effect on state revenues.

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The Department has received budgetary approval to utilize the existing Hippotherapy waiver benefit appropriated budget for the anticipated cost of this proposed rule. The rates will remain the same as that authorized for the Hippotherapy benefit, therefore this service is a budget-neutral addition.

4. Compare the probable costs and benefits of the proposed rule to the probable costs and benefits of inaction.

The Department of Health Care Policy and Financing anticipates serving 275 members and utilizing the existing Hippotherapy waiver benefit allocated budget for this expansion of services that will improve member outcome. Inaction would result in less available services to our waiver members.

5. Determine whether there are less costly methods or less intrusive methods for achieving the purpose of the proposed rule.

The Department has not identified any less costly methods or less intrusive methods for achieving the purpose of the proposed regulation changes.

6. Describe any alternative methods for achieving the purpose for the proposed rule that were seriously considered by the Department and the reasons why they were rejected in favor of the proposed rule.

There are no alternative methods for achieving the purpose for the proposed rule. The only method of allow the benefit changes as proposed is to amend existing rules.
