Overview of the 1115 Waiver known as Comprehensive Care for Colorado



What is a waiver?

Federal rules govern Medicaid and CHP+ eligibility, required benefits

Services in the State Plan meet all of these requirements

Waiver Request



States can request to WAIVE federal rules to have more flexibility to offer more coverage to more people and cover more services for certain populations or settings.

Approval comes with additional reporting requirements for a 5-year period.

Phase 1 2025

Summer

- Phase 1 of Housing Services

Fall/Winter

- Extended inpatient stays for persons with Serious Mental Illness
- Medicaid Reentry and Community Health Services in state facilities
- *All timelines are based on expected CMS approvals and subject to change



Phase 2 Winter 2026

Continuous Eligibility for children 0-3

Continuous eligibility for adults exiting carceral setting for a 12 month period

Long Term Services & Support users receive presumptive eligibility (amendment submitted but not yet approved)



Phase 3 Summer 2026

Pantry Stocking/Delivered meals for Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) and Community Access Team (CAT) voucher recipients

Additional Housing Services for former foster youth

Medicaid Reentry and Community Health Services in jails



Phase 4 Summer 2027

Pantry Stocking/Delivered meals for PSH and CAT voucher Recipients

Additional Housing Services for former foster youth



Substance Use Disorder (SUD) "Expanding the Substance Use Disorder Continuum of Care"



SUD Overview

• Originally the only services in the waiver. Approved and implemented in Jan 2021.

• Services:

- Residential SUD treatment
- > Withdrawal management
- Full continuum of outpatient services
- Eligibility:
 - ➤ 21-64 years in age



Successes of the SUD Demonstration (July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2023)

- The State completed significant activities to ensure coverage for the full continuum of care for SUD services
- Increase in members receiving Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and SUD services
- Modest increases in network adequacy and provider capacity



Upcoming

- Strengthen access to care across all critical levels of care
- Improve retention in care
- Improve follow-up after hospitalizations and emergency department use
- Improve care coordination and treatment level transitions
- Transition to new ASAM requirements



Health-Related Social Needs (HRSN)

Housing and Nutrition



What are Health-Related Social Needs?

- Non-medical factors that influence a person's health and well-being
- Includes things like housing, utilities, nutrition and food, transportation, employment, environmental safety, and interpersonal violence

Extensive research has indicated these factors can account for as much as 50% of health outcomes.



What is Colorado doing with HRSN with an Amendment?

- Housing Services
- Nutrition Services
- Year 1 Goal: Serve 1,000-1,500 Members





Housing Services

Colorado may provide housing-related services in a phased approach:

- Case management for access to housing supports
- Pre-tenancy navigation services
- Tenancy sustaining services
- One-time transition and moving costs
- Rental assistance and utility assistance
- In addition to eligibility criteria, members must qualify for a housing voucher through DOH



HRSN Populations

Housing & nutrition services for the following populations:

- Individuals eligible for Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) vouchers experiencing a behavioral health need and/or chronic health condition
- Individuals eligible for Community Access Team (CAT) vouchers
- Individuals eligible for Colorado Fostering Success (CFS) vouchers



Eligibility Criteria for PSH

- Medicaid eligible
- Be 18 years of age or older
- Have a disabling condition
- Have a history of homelessness or be at risk of homelessness
- Must be at or below 30% of the area median income
- Meet Clinical Criteria
 - Diagnosed behavioral health need, AND/OR
 - Chronic Health Condition



Eligibility for CAT

Community Access Team (CAT) Vouchers are available to Members that:

- Exiting institutions using Targeted Case Management -Transition Coordination (TCM-TC) and moving into the community using a Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) waiver and who need a housing voucher to afford housing in the community.
- At risk of institutionalization due to unstable housing



Eligibility for CFS (SB23-082)

Colorado Fostering Success (CFS) Vouchers are available to youth:

- Being at least 18 years of age but less than 26 years of age;
- Prior experience in one of several ways with the foster care or kinship care system;
- Currently experiencing homelessness or at imminent risk of homelessness, as defined by the program advisory board;
- Being a Colorado resident; and
- Having an income level below the DOLA determined income level.



Recent Progress

- Increasing providers to serve PSH clients
- Building out the medical benefit
- Finalizing payment mechanisms





Who will provide the housing services?

Providers that previously participated in Colorado Medicaid housing demonstrations are enrolling and getting ready to serve Members.

Only those enrolled as a Supportive Housing Provider (PT 89/208) will be able to bill for the HRSN housing services.



Housing Services Timeline

Eligibility for Nutrition Services

- Based on housing voucher eligibility
- Screening requirements to be determined
- Must be medically appropriate and documented

Changing care for persons experiencing **Serious Mental Illness and Serious** Emotional Disturbance (SMI/SED)



Changes to Inpatient Care

- Serious Mental Illness (SMI) or Children with a Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED)
- Reimbursement for stays up to 60 days if medically necessary
- Comprehensive continuum of care to treat SMI/SED including inpatient, outpatient, and communitybased services.



Eligibility for SMI/SED services

- Eligible Individuals:
 - >21-64 years in age
- Eligible Settings:
 - SMI/SED services in Institutions for Mental Disease (IMDs)
 - CSU/ATUs
 - Free Standing Psych Hospitals
- Covered Services:
 - Allow reimbursement for up to 60 days while maintaining an average length of stay of 30 days for each member

Continuous Eligibility (CE)

- CE means keeping members enrolled for a certain period of time, regardless of life changes that would otherwise cause a loss of coverage like income.
- Goals:
 - Ensure coverage for young children and vulnerable adults.
 - Promote access to physical, behavioral, dental, and preventive services.



Medicaid Reentry and Community Health (M-REACH)



M-REACH Overview Continued

• Covered Services:

- Case management 90 days prior to release
 Medication assisted treatment (MAT), including medications paired with counseling
 A 30-day supply of all
- prescription medications upon release



M-REACH Overview

 Eligible Individuals:
 > All incarcerated Medicaid and CHP+ members, 90 days prior to release

• Eligible Settings:

- Phase I: Division of Youth Services and Department of Corrections beginning July 1, 2025 pending outstanding federal authority
- Phase 2: Local jails and tribal detention centers beginning July 1, 2026



M-REACH Recent Progress

- Applied for the Reentry State Planning Grant to help with implementation
- HCPF has been working closely with state partners at DOC and DYS to prepare Phase 1 facilities to participate in M-REACH and establish capacity to bill Medicaid
- Each facility must pass a Facility Readiness Assessment before HCPF can pay for services provided at that location



Continuous Eligibility



Continuous Eligibility

- Applies to children ages 0 until the end of their 3rd birthday month
- Adults 19-65 leaving a state Department of Corrections (DOC) facility for 12 months
- Planned Effective Date Is January 1, 2026



Children Age 0-3

- Children will be continuously eligible from the day they are born until the end of their third birthday month.
- Regardless of changes in household income, or immigration status.
- Applies to children in Health First Colorado and Child Health Plan *Plus* (CHP+).
- Annual renewals are automated.



Adults Leaving DOC

- Adults ages 19 to 65 who are leaving a state Dept. Of Correction facility are continuously eligible for Health First Colorado or CHP+ coverage for 12 months after release.
- They will remain in CE regardless of changes in income, unless requested.

Presumptive Eligibility for Long-Term Services and Supports



LTSS Presumptive Eligibility

- Presumptive eligibility permits the enrollment of members in benefit programs who are likely to be ultimately eligible for the program
- Will allow an eligible adult to receive a defined set of benefits and services while their Long-Term Care Medicaid application is processed
- Can allow members a greater chance of residing in their environment of choice



LTSS Presumptive Eligibility

Eligibility Criteria:

- Meet level-of-care eligibility for Home Community Based Services (HCBS)
- Meet financial eligibility for Long-Term Care Medicaid
- Be experiencing one or more defined crisis criteria



LTSS Presumptive Eligibility

Services:

- An established package of services will be offered and may include things like personal care, meals, and/or State Plan Benefits
- Assistance with Long-Term Care Medicaid enrollment and other support
