EXPAND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SAFETY NET

**FUNDING:
\$30.0 M**

GOAL: Expand and strengthen the BH safety net, as outlined in SB19-222

- SB19-222 stipulated the development of services to address needs of people at risk of institutionalization
 - Addresses gaps in transition-level service availability
- \$24M in RAE incentives to expand availability high intensity outpatient services in the RAE networks for those with acute and/or chronic BH needs.
 - High intensity outpatient services include, but are not limited to:
 - Intensive outpatient services (SUD, SMI, co-occurring)
 - Assertive Community Treatment (ACT)
 - Multisystemic Therapy
 - Community Psychiatric Supportive Treatment
 - Step-down services for people leaving institutions and corrections

EXPAND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SAFETY NET

**FUNDING:
\$30.0 M**

GOAL: Expand and strengthen the BH safety net, as outlined in SB19-222

- \$6M for Technical Assistance and Strategic Planning
 - Statewide stakeholder engagement for rule promulgation
 - Provider trainings on:
 - New provider regulations and becoming a provider
 - How to bill
 - The BHASOs
 - Universal contracting
 - Technology advancement impact
 - Cost reporting
 - Recommend and Roll out Value Based Payment/Alternative Payment Models in July 2023 and July 2024

EXPAND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SAFETY NET

**FUNDING:
\$30.0 M**

GOAL: Expand and strengthen the BH safety net, as outlined in SB19-222

ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES:

- 1 Increased access to high intensity outpatient services
- 2 Improved service delivery options for crisis and transition programs
- 3 Opportunities for Value-Based Payment incentives linked to quality outcomes
- 4 Improved provider understanding of safety net system reform
- 5 Improved access to integrated care
- 6 Greater accessibility to multi-level behavioral health care in communities

GOAL: Short-term grant funding for behavioral health crisis and transition services between residential/inpatient and outpatient care

- Support members moving from institute or corrections to the community
- Focus on increasing capacity for community-based care
- May include the following types of services:
 - High-intensity outpatient services
 - Crisis stabilization and acute treatment services
 - In-home respite
 - Co-occurring need integrated care

GOAL: Short-term grant funding for behavioral health crisis and transition services between residential/inpatient and outpatient care

- Request for Applications
 - Applicants can include providers and local government entities
 - Specific focus on historically underserved and under-resourced communities and populations, including:
 - Rural
 - Frontier
 - Tribal
 - BIPOC Individuals
 - LGBTIA+ Individuals
 - Grant writing assistance available through CU Anschutz program
 - Fiscal and program grant management assistance will be provided

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH TRANSITION SUPPORT

**FUNDING:
\$14.0 M**

GOAL: Short-term grant funding for behavioral health crisis and transition services between residential/inpatient and outpatient care

ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES:

Improve health and welfare for Medicaid members

Improve service delivery options for crisis and transition programs

Create pathways that improve care transitions

Funding to support infrastructure, infection control, community integration

GOAL: Health-care practice transformation to support whole-person health through integrated care models

- Grant program for:
 - Physical health care providers
 - Behavioral health care providers
- Specific focus
 - Implement evidence-based clinical integration care models
 - Coordination of care between providers of varying disciplines
 - Emphasis on priority populations, children/youth, pregnant/parenting people

GOAL: Health-care practice transformation to support whole-person health through integrated care models

- Stakeholder engagement will include:
 - Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs)
 - Safety Net Clinics
 - Community Mental Health Centers (CMHCs)/Behavioral Health Providers
 - Children's Hospital and other hospitals
 - Rural communities
 - Patients and families
- Health Care Policy and Financing (HCPF) will establish a set of statewide resources for grantees
 - Technical assistance will be provided to grantees
 - Funding available through December, 2024

HEALTH CARE PRACTICE TRANSFORMATION

**FUNDING:
\$31.75 M**

GOAL: Health-care practice transformation to support whole-person health through integrated care models

ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES:

- 1 Improve health and welfare for Medicaid members
- 2 Increase access to behavioral health screening, referral, treatment, and recovery care¹
- 3 Implement sustainable evidence-based integrated health care services
- 4 Address service access for priority populations and underserved communities

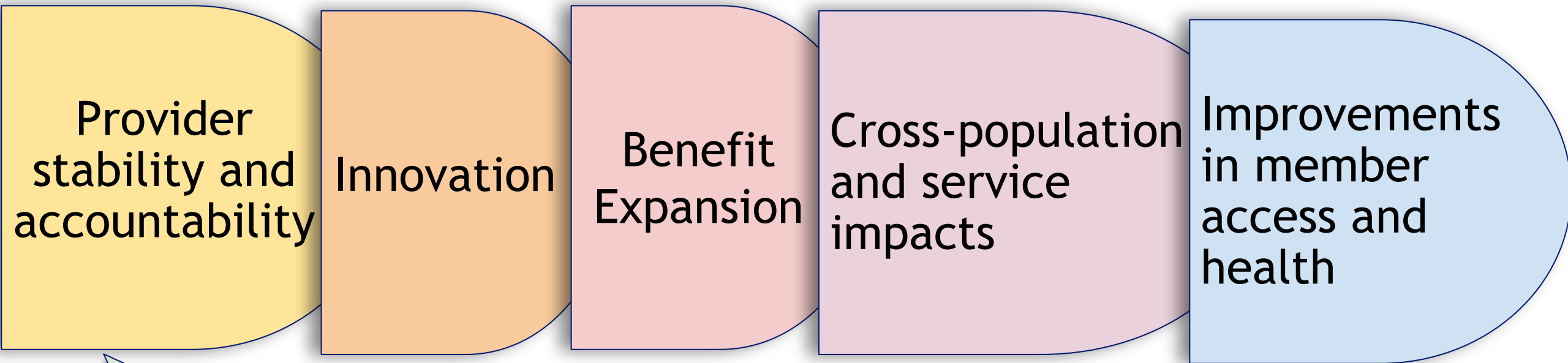

Accessing Funding

- Behavioral Health Safety Net Reform
 - \$24M available through partnership with the Regional Accountable Entity (RAE)
 - They will determine distribution and spending purpose based on service access gap analyses
- Behavioral Health Transition Support
 - \$14M available through RFA
 - RFA will be released in the coming weeks
 - Prioritizes underserved communities and populations
- Health Care Practice Transformation
 - \$31.75M available through RFA
 - RFA will be published in January 2023

Behavioral Health Administration

- The Behavioral Health Administration (BHA) has funding opportunities for:
 - Workforce Development
