The number of people in Colorado who need Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS) is growing, and many people rely on Health First Colorado (Colorado's Medicaid program) to pay for that care. The way we provide LTSS and measure its quality is changing too.

LTSS can be in the home, community-based, or in an institutional setting.



Medicare does not pay for LTSS.




Between 2015 and 2030, the number of older adults in Colorado will grow by nearly 70%.¹



An estimated 70% of people 65 or older will need LTSS at some point in their lives.²

Health First Colorado is increasingly providing LTSS in members' homes and communities.3



LTSS helps Health First Colorado members and their families with daily living activities including, but not limited to:



Bathing



Dressing



Transportation



Medication Management



Food Preparation



Supported Employment

Person-Centeredness



The Department continues to focus on person-centeredness, so our members who receive LTSS:

Measuring Quality⁴



Colorado participates in multiple National Core Indicators surveys, which measure LTSS quality and person-centeredness over time and compares results across states. Among Colorado respondents:

74% Colorado Intellectual and Developmental
Disabilities (IDD) - Able to go out and
do the things s/he likes to do in the
community as often as s/he wants:
US = 79%

56%Colorado

Aging and Disability Survey (AD) - Proportion of people who get to do the things they enjoy outside of their home as much as they want to:
US = 63%
