4. MMIS Reprocurement

Parrish Steinbrecher, HCPF

Timeline for reprocurement:

- Two year timeline before reprocurement.
- State and Federal regulation is that the maximum for a contract is 10 years (including 2 extensions).
- HP/DXC/Gainwell: MMIS expires in 2023- can be extended for 18 months with approval.
- Truven/IBM: BIDM expires in 2024- Extended 12 months.
- Magellan: PBMS expires in 2024

Medicaid Enterprise Services Update

- Foundation is already built by the current systems.
- Continuity by vendor meetings, EPMO, MIDA and comms teams.
- Modularity by CMS requirement/ITN
- Integration by MIDA team/SI
- Modular procurements allow states to procure best in class services from the best vendor(s)
- Some of the vendors have sub-contractors that need to be transitioned:
 - □ Care and Case Management tool (MedCompass)
 - ClaimsXten
 - □ Electronic Visit Verification (EVV)

Conceptual Future State

- Will hire a MIDA systems integrator to take the interface files, provide governance, oversite, formatting and cloud solutions so that API's are written.
- What is changing- Going from one MMIS solution to 7 solutions.
- 37 solicitations from vendors that are being reviewed.

5. Tribal Relationships with Health First Colorado

History of Tribal Relations:

- Native Americans in what is now Colorado stretches back over 12,000 years.
- The region was populated by Clovis, Folsom, Fremont and Puebloan peoples.
- Because of this long-storied history of Native peoples as the original stewards, we as a Nation and State strive to honor and protect our commitments and special relations with Tribal nations.

Tribal Relations Background:

- Throughout treaties signed over decades and centuries, American Indian/Alaska Native Tribes throughout the nation have been granted rights and status that both encourage and require use to recognize that:
 - □ Tribes have the right to self-determination and a government of the own choosing.
 - □ Tribal sovereignty is the recognition that a federally recognized Tribe is a nation in and of itself.
 - □ Tribal self-determination means that our government-to-government relationship matters.
 - □ Tribes through their own sovereignty have the legal authority to determine their own future.
 - □ In Colorado we do not force, require or mandate anything of our Tribes.

Colorado's Tribes:

• There are two federally recognized Tribes in Colorado. Ute Mountain Ute Tribe



and Southern Ute Indian Tribe. Both Tribes have ancestral ties in the State of Colorado along with numbers other peoples: Ute, Cheyenne, Arapaho, Apache, Shoshone, Comanche, Kiowa and Navajo.

- Denver Indian Health and Family Services
- Denver Indian Family Resource Center
- Rocky Mountain Health Plans

How HCPF engages with our Tribes:

- Programmatic Action Log sent regularly to Tribal Council, Tribal health staff and other key players.
- Formal Tribal Consultation occurs annually.
- CCIA engagement between state agencies and Tribal Councils occurs quarterly.

6. Provider Revalidation & Participation Agreement Updates

Marceil Case, HCPF

Provider Revalidation:

- PHE- Temporarily waived fees, fingerprint checks and revalidation. This will change at the end of the PHE.
- States will have 6 months to get provider revalidations done.
- Starting an outreach program.
- Providers not revalidated and not billing will be notified, then terminated. Direct outreach will be provided to larger and consistently billing providers.
- Letters to provider associations, bulletins and portal announcements.

Provider Participation Agreement:

- Release date of the document is December 1, 2022.
- Providers signify agreement by logging into the Portal.

Colorado's NPI Law:

- Set up by well-meaning Legislators to give the State agency information about where provider services are being rendered.
- Each organizational provider service location must have a unique NPI, as well as each provider type at a specific service location (e.g. a medical clinic and a dental clinic at the same address are enrolled separately and each need a unique NPI).
