What is *your* definition of dignity

To treat someone
with dignity is to treat
them as being of worth,
in a way that is respectful
of them as valued
individuals

Dignity in care
means the **kind of care/ support**, in any setting,
which supports and
promotes, and does not
undermine, a person's
self-respect, regardless
of **difference**

Dignity consists
of many overlapping
aspects, involving
respect, privacy,
autonomy and selfworth



Definitions of Dignity



Treating people with respect

Listening to people

Responding to the person as soon as requested

Maintaining confidentiality

Dignity is about being treated as an individual with respect and compassion.

Putting the person receiving care at the center of things

Asking what their specific wants and needs are


Giving information when asked

Not telling parents everything



Dignity in Care

Lack of respect for an individual's dignity in care can take many forms and may differ from person to person. The following are some examples we have heard from people when they felt their dignity was not respected:



Feeling neglected or ignored whilst receiving care

Being treated more as an object than a person

Feeling their privacy
was not being respected
during personal care i.e.,
being forced to use a
commode rather than
being provided with a
wheelchair and / or
supported to use the
bathroom

When staff make it obvious that they are paid to be with them when in public



Dignity, Human Rights and our Responsibility



Human rights belong to everyone

They are the basic rights we all have simply because we are human, regardless of who we are, where we live or what we do

Human rights should be at the center of everything we do

Need to focus on quality of life and individual outcomes rather than needs and processes Human rights
represent all the
things that are
important to us as
human beings,
such as being able
to choose how to
live our life and
being treated with
dignity and respect.

Fairness, Respect, Equality, Dignity, & Autonomy






Dignity, Respect and PWS







Nothing About Me, without Me



Discussions and meetings about a person, should involve them

The person you are supporting is the MOST important person on the team

Decisions should not be made about care without their informed consent (exceptions are made when capacity evaluations deem it necessary)



Diet / Nutrition



Refrain from eating / drinking in front of individuals with PWS

Be aware of perfume, gum, lotions, air fresheners


Refrain from cooking food that has smells or ordering food to their home that they aren't eating

Activities of Daily Living










Meal Planning / Preparation
