

Health First Colorado (Colorado's Medicaid Program) and Public Charge

You can use most public benefits, including Health First Colorado and Child Health Plan *Plus* (CHP+) and it will not harm your immigration status.

What is Public Charge?

- The public charge test decides if a person might use government services in the future. The test includes your age, income, health, education/skills, and your sponsor's affidavit.
- Some people must pass a public charge test when they apply for a green card (lawful permanent residence) or a visa to enter the United States.

Does Public Charge Rule Affect Me?

- Using most public benefits is not considered in a public charge test (Table 1).
- **Applying** for any public benefits is **not considered** in a public charge test.
- Benefits used by family members are **not considered** in **your** public charge test.
- The public charge rule **does not apply** to all immigration statuses (Table 2).

People applying for a green card or visa from outside the U.S.			

Contact a legal expert or a trusted community organization if you are concerned about the public charge rule.

How Has the Public Charge Rule Changed?

- The public charge rule changed in December 2022 and limited the benefits considered in a public charge test.
- The December 2022 policy does **not** change eligibility rules for public benefits programs.

Will My Information Be Shared?

Information you provide on an application is confidential and cannot be shared with U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. Colorado law protects your personal information when applying for or enrolling in most public benefits. Your information may only be shared with some federal agencies if there is an audit from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and the Office of the Inspector General. If shared, the information does not impact your immigration status and can't be used in a public charge determination.
